Tell us a little bit about yourself. Where are you from?

What is something unique about you? I am from Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, Canada. I was fortunate to grow up with parents who were just as passionate about sports as I was, which led to them spending copious amounts of time at the soccer field and basketball court on the

weekends. When I was fifteen and starting tenth grade, I had the opportunity to move away from home to play a higher level of soccer, and I took it. I spent that first year living with my cousin in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and then was living on my own for my last two years of high school. It was a unique experience that was difficult at the time, but certainly helped me develop a sense of independence and strong work ethic from a young age.

How did you end up at MC? What brought you here?

After deciding to transfer as a sophomore, I began my junior year at MC in the middle of the pandemic. What initially drew me to the school was the successful year the women's soccer team had prior to my arrival. However, it was the people that stood out to me when I visited. What's been the most rewarding part of your time here at MC and in the School of Business?


MC and the School of Business have allowed me to get so much out of my academic experience beyond the classroom. Since arriving at MC, I have been part of Dr. Eduardo's Student Advisory Board which has allowed me to play an active role in improving the student experience. This year, I had the opportunity to fill in and teach an undergraduate class as well as tutor fellow student-athletes on behalf of the athletic department. This has reaffirmed my desire to eventually teach in the collegiate setting at some point in my future. Being able to take what I have learned and apply it in this way has allowed me to learn practical skills alongside what I have been taught in class.

What advice would you give to a student considering being a collegiate athlete?

he people of Guam are fluent in English, but Chamorro—the language of Guam's original inhabitants, is spoken as well. Part of the study abroad program includes immersion in the local culture and learning a little bit of the Chamorro language. Key in developing the program was MC's partnership with seven entities. Partners included Mississippi Development Authority (MDA), Mississippi Manufacturers Association, Mississippi Council on Economic Education, Clinton Economic Development, Rankin First, Innovate Mississippi, and the University of Guam (UOG). MDA has offices in Tokyo, Japan and Seoul, South Korea which influenced MC's focus in the Asia-Pacific region. Dr. Morehead's longstanding relationship with partners and alumni in Guam further narrowed MC's focus to the island of Guam.

The grant allows support for three main pillars: study abroad travel, development of a cross-cultural business management minor, and faculty research. The largest funded portion of the grant includes almost \$50,000 to support up to 24 students traveling to Guam over the life of the grant. While it is currently a two-year grant, it is expected to be extended to a third year because of the slow implementation due to COVID-19.

During the summer of 2022, MC's first group of four students and two faculty traveled to Guam for three weeks in June. The group was able to see most of the island and visit numerous businesses, government agencies, and economic development entities. The visits included Guam Visitors Bureau and Calvo Enterprises (one of the largest grocers on the island and whose CEO is former Governor Eddie Calvo). Also included were visits with Guam Power Authority, Port of Guam, Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, University of Guam, and the mayor of Inalahan.

Several of the island's five-star hotels met with MC to discuss the impact of COVID-19 on the tourism industry. During a visit to the Guam legislature, a discussion about the U.S. military buildup was hosted by Guam Vice-Speaker, Senator Muña Barnes. The discussion was led by former Assistant Secretary of the U.S. Department of Interior, Tony Babauta.

Beyond the working part of the trip, students and faculty were able to visit waterfalls, a site where a Japanese WWII fighter hid for 28 years while he thought he was still at war, and WWII Pacific sites. The group was also able to spend time snorkeling and surfing in both the Pacific Ocean and Philippine Sea. Others enjoyed walks on the beach, hiking, parasailing, and parachuting from a plane at 14,000 feet.

Finally, the group visited with three MC alumni living and working in Guam: Rodalyn Gerardo ('19, C.P.A., M.B.A.)-VP, finance and administration, Guam Community College; Yuka Hechanova ('20, C.P.A., M.Acc.)—CFO, Guam Memorial Hospital; and Jeremiah Luther ('09, J.D.)-chief counsel, Guam Memorial Hospital.


The Mississippi Entrepreneurship Forum (MEF) held the 2021 inaugural NextUp! Statewide Student Pitch Competition for all college students in Mississippi. The Forum is designed to bring together the innovation community and discuss resources and strategies for Mississippi entrepreneurs.

tudents from all Mississippi colleges, universities, and community colleges were invited to compete in the rapid-fire contest, pitching their pioneering business ideas to a distinguished panel of judges comprised of the state's top entrepreneurs and investors.

Two MC School of Business students captured two of the top three awards at this year's virtual event. An entrepreneurship and marketing major from Wetumpka, Alabama, Rachel Graham impressed the judges to earn a 2nd-place award by pitching Studio 274, a ballet and exercise innovative business model, receiving a \$1,500 cash prize. Terry Cox of Semmes, Alabama, achieved a third-place finish for his proposal promoting Argo Creations, an innovative take on landscape planning and enhancement, receiving a \$1,000 award.

Graham began forming her business idea in her first entrepreneurship class taken her freshman year. In preparation for the competition, she spent six months taking her idea to a ready to launch business model by receiving mentorship from Tasha Bibbs and Nathan Killebrew who both helped fine tune her pitch. Graham's model for the ballet studio, Studio 274, would strengthen parental involvement, get the community engaged, and make owners more business-minded through integrating a tea shop, Pilates studio, and ballet studio into one functioning business.

"The competition allowed me to fully experience the necessary steps to make a plausible business model and to curate a pitch to raise support for that model. I now have practical experience on taking the first steps to starting my own business," Graham commented.






In 2001, Wally decided to pursue an opportunity that would lead to business ownership. He and two other partners founded Advanced Disposal Services, Inc.

arah Thomas became the first full-time female official in NFL history on April 8, 2015, when she was one of nine new game officials added to the NFL officiating roster for the 2015 season.

Prior to the NFL milestone, Thomas was hired as an official by Conference USA. She became the first female to officiate a NCAA major college football bowl game. In 2015, her history-making game happened — an NFL game between the Kansas City Chiefs and Houston Texans. Thomas' hat, whistle and flag from that game are now on display at the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Wrapping up the 2020 NFL season, Thomas shattered the glass ceiling when she was selected to work Super Bowl LV in Tampa, Florida — making her the first-ever female Super Bowl official.

MC Business was incredibly fortunate to have Sarah Thomas join the MC Business Speaker Series. She shared valuable insight on hard work, determination, and believing in yourself. Thomas encouraged MC students to stay true to themselves while doing what they are passionate about. She further encouraged them to take steps towards their goals for the right reasons. Corkern loves teaching and loves her students. Her effectiveness is exemplified by those students who graduate and go on to take the CPA exam, many of whom write or call to thank Dr. Corkern for her diligence in the classroom.

Former student, Seth Matthews recalls, "I've carried the image of the cash flow pumpkin with me through the CPA exam and work. I'll never forget it." Former graduate student, Lauryn Rawlins, expressed how supportive and adaptive Dr. Corkern was over the past couple of years. he premiere global organization dedicated to improving the quality of business education around the world has re-accredited the School of Business at Mississippi College.

The Board of Directors for the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) has ratified its Continuous Improvement Review Committee's recommendation for re-accreditation of the business degree programs offered at MC.

Mississippi College is in the 8% of schools in the world that have earned the accreditation.

"Every AACSB-accredited school has demonstrated a focus on excellence in all areas, including teaching, research, curricula development, and student learning," said Stephanie M. Bryant, AACSB executive vice president and chief accreditation officer. "The intense peer-review process exemplifies their commitment to quality business education."

Dr. Marcelo Eduardo said AACSB is the "gold standard" of accrediting bodies for schools of business.

To achieve re-accreditation, the School of Business went through a rigorous, five-year internal process that culminated with a site visit in February by members of the AACSB's Peer Review Team. Throughout the process, the school focused on developing and implementing a plan that aligned with the AACSB's accreditation standards, which require excellence in strategic management and innovation; faculty, staff, and student participation; learning and teaching; and academic and professional engagement.

"It's a very lengthy process." But well worth the effort, Eduardo said, especially for those who attend the school.

"The bottom line is that this accreditation is for the students," he said. "We want our students to be as competitive as any graduates from any AACSB-accredited school. This is the way to do that."

AACSB accreditation matters to MC students like Cairo Plauche, a senior accounting major from Fairhope, Alabama, who graduated May 5.

"Our AACSB accreditation is incredibly important to me as a student in the School of Business, because it shows that the school has truly prioritized its commitment to academic excellence. It means that I am surrounded by faculty and students who are committed to challenging the status quo by striving to make ourselves better each day. The school is focused on keeping students engaged through its many clubs, challenging coursework, and endless opportunities to obtain real-world experience."

Graduate students like Parker Brooks of Tupelo, who received his B.B.A. in finance from MC and obtained his M.B.A. with a finance concentration on May 5, 2022, rely on the school's AACSB accreditation to compete with graduates of larger institutions.

"As a business student, starting a career in finance and accounting can be extremely competitive," said Brooks, who recently accepted a junior position with Capital One's commercial lending services. "Knowing we hold the same accreditation status as top-tier Ivy League schools helps even the playing field."

He said gaining re-accreditation reflects how much the MC School of Business faculty cares for the quality of its educational programs.

For this round of re-accreditation, Eduardo said the faculty focused on three significant priorities in the School of Business: a new entrepreneurship major, the school's ability to offer M.B.A. classes fully online or face-to-face, and the school's research enterprise.

"The site visitors were impressed by the research output of our faculty and how they've managed to continue to remain relevant and at the top of their field," he said. "Faculty at larger universities teach fewer classes and have more time for research. It's a little more challenging for our faculty, who have regular teaching loads.

He credited all 21 members of the School of Business faculty for the successful re-accreditation, while noting that the coordination provided throughout the process by Dr. Sara B. Kimmel, associate professor in the School of Business who served as re-accreditation coordinator, was invaluable.

"This was a total faculty effort," Eduardo said. "You cannot gain re-accreditation by a handful of faculty participating. Everyone has to perform at the highest level. That speaks so much about how dedicated our faculty members are."

aylor Corso was announced as the 2022 Pittman Young Faculty of the Year recipient during Mississippi College's Ceremony last May. A Certified Public Accountant and an

expert in taxation and financial services, Corso teaches Intermediate Accounting, which covers theory and techniques in the preparation and interpretation of financial statements. Corso serves as a role model for her students, according

to Dr. Eduardo.

"In her short time at MC Business, Taylor Corso has already made her mark in the continuing tradition of beloved accounting instructors that balance high expectations of their students with the nurturing care and attention that brings the best out of these future accounting professionals," Eduardo said, "Dr. Corso has demonstrated the truth in that approach while teaching a wide range of courses, including Business Law, Accounting, Cost Accounting, Principles of Accounting."

During every educational encounter, she keeps one thing in mind. "I try to remember the mindset I had when I was a student," she said. "A lot about the accounting path can be overwhelming. There can be information overload at times. I take time to tell them what they can expect in their careers. I go over some of the basics, give general career and resumebuilding advice, interview tips, and information about accounting firm culture - things I didn't know and might have been hesitant to ask when I was their age."

Corso extends the same open communication policy to her students that she shares with the Dean and her other MC Business colleagues.

"I focus on being extremely accessible. I like my students to know they can come to me for anything they need. They find a lot of comfort in that, and it's one of the best parts of my job. My students know my office door is open to them, and I love that they feel welcome to come to see me."

Another asset that sets MC Business apart: the ability to discuss matters of faith in the classroom. From the start of her academic career, Corso has injected ethical questions into her lively discussions with students.

"Ethics and accounting – you can't split those up," she said. "Those two things are inherently connected. I always talk about how faith plays a part in our professional role as an accountant. It's not just a professional code of conduct. Who you are as a person is so much more important than who you are as a professional, but you have an opportunity as a professional to exhibit who you are as a person."

"We have the opportunity at MC to explore how our ethics and morality are led by our faith and belief in the Bible. Being able to discuss those concepts in the classroom is such a privilege. It allows students to further develop in their own faith," Dr. Corso said.

"We're blessed in the School of Business to have such outstanding faculty members educating our students," Eduardo said. "Our commitment to academic excellence and the cause of Christ is being led by faculty that would be the envy of any other institution."
